#### **PRESIDENTS REPORT:**

Despite occasional difficulties caused by labour disruption, the 2022/3 **MinSouth** year managed to conduct lectures regularly. MinSouth members and other interested people could attend lectures either in person or virtually: these were referred to as hybrid lectures. Occasionally, lectures were held only virtually. Our two main concourses for MinSouth lectures are at the IoM3 building on Euston Street and The Counting House on Cornhill pub. Both these buildings are in London. Unfortunately, the room where MinSouth had most meetings in The Counting House, the Griffin Room, is being renovated to be used for hotel rooms. As such, we are planning to continue using The Counting House but will be using other rooms. The first lecture was presented by Ken Darlington, *Vice-president of Business Development* for **Ultra-Safe Nuclear Corporation (USNC)** entitled *Using Micro-Nuclear Reactors at mining operations*. This was on October 18<sup>th</sup> and was hybrid where the physical location was The Counting House. Mr. Darlington introduced the green technology of using micro-Nuclear Reactors to power mining operations from Montréal, Québec Canada. The second lecture was virtual and was on November 10<sup>th</sup> entitled *Trends and Best Practices in ESG in Mining*. Katie Fedosenko, *Director, ESG Engagement* presented this topic for **Teck Resources Limited** who had opened an office in London in 2022. Ms. Fedesenko discussed Teck's work in mining copper, zinc and steel making coal throughout the world and how they are focusing on Environment, Social and Governance. The next lecture was hybrid and was on January 12<sup>th</sup>. It was entitled *Worker Health Considerations in Rare Earth Element Mining*. Ms. Gordon is a Certified Industrial Hygienist who is a *Senior Occupational Hygienist* with **WSP Golder**. She is based in Nanaimo, BC Canada. She presented this talk virtually from Nanaimo. MinSouth members watched it either from the **Mine** in the **IoM3 building** on Euston Road or from another location of their choosing.

Annually, we have a joint meeting with the **British Tunnelling Society**. This was held on the 9<sup>th</sup> of February as a hybrid meeting where the physical portion was held in the **Institution of Civil Engineers** building in London. Clare Onal of **Mott MacDonald** presented *Kidston Pumped Storage Project*. The MinSouth Heat of the **Young Persons Lecture Competition** was held on March 9<sup>th</sup>. It was also held as a hybrid event. The location for attendees was at the **Royal School of Mines** in Kensington, London. This year's competition winner was Lara Tritton from the University of Leicester. Her lecture was entitled – *Sourcing critical metals Te, Bi, and W as by-products from Björkdal Gold Mine, Sweden.* The competition was similar with two joint second places winners Marek Zatapilo from Imperial College presented *Iron oxide impurities in ore concentrates from the Moma titanium mine, Mozambique – their origin and implications for processing and Oscar Ryans from WSP presented <i>Tailing Storage Dam Break Assessment – Triple Cascade Failure.* All three of these competition lectures can be viewed on the MinSouth website under Meeting Videos

On April 13<sup>th</sup>, Joe Carr, *Mining Innovation Director* of **Axora** presented *An overview of seabed mining operations*. This was the first joint meeting held with the **Young Mining Professionals of London.** It was a hybrid meeting where the physical base was in The Counting House on Cornhill. Some technical difficulties were encountered. People trying to attend virtually could not hear. The recording was also poor. Axora kindly offered to rerecord it. The joint **Women in Mining-UK**/MinSouth on May 18<sup>th</sup> was virtual and was entitled *Indigenous Women in the Mining Industry: From Challenges to Opportunities.* This was a panel discussion of global indigenous women leaders who shared the challenges they continue to encounter in the mining industry while embracing the opportunities. Indigenous women from Canada, South Africa and Australia participated in the discussion.

The **Prestige Lecture** is MinSouth's archetype lecture where a member of a mining companies' executive gives an insightful lecture. This year Paul Atherley, *Chairman* of **Pensana Plc.** gave an excellent presentation entitled: *The advancement of UK's REE self-sustenance*.

Finally, **MinSouth's Annual Quiz** was on December 14<sup>th</sup>, 2022. Julian Aldridge once again did an excellent job of preparing and giving the questions. It was originally intended to hold this quiz in hybrid format. However, labour disruption prevented that so it was all virtual & there were fewer attendees than usual. However, the winning team was comprised of the Honorable Secretary, Clive Hallett, and last year's president, Simon Kocher who applied their knowledge of mineral processing and crystal morphology to answer the questions.

These events were advertised by posting on the MinSouth webpage as both a Calendar event and MinSouth News. For those members who have specified through the **Institute of Materials, Minerals and Mining (IoM3)** that **MinSouth** is a preferred community, MinSouth activities are posted on the IoM3 web page. We also post the activities through MinSouth's X (formerly Twitter) account. Finally, we are now posting on MinSouth's new LinkedIn page. It is a good avenue for following MinSouth activities so feel free to follow us. Updates are no longer being posted on the old MinSouth LinkedIn Group page. It is being planned to discontinue this page at the end of 2023.

Although many of our attendance figures to the venues were lower, more people attended most lectures than usual because they were provided virtually. Except for that one April blip, virtual presentations were accessible to all.

MinSouth continues to provide financial support to students. Three students from *Camborne School of Mines* were given bursaries.

Next year, there will be some changes in the council. In addition to the fact that I will be transferring presidency to Mark Burnett, we will have a new Honorary Secretary. Our former Honorary Secretary, Clive Hallett, will be stepping down due to commitments following being elected as Borough Councillor for Ashford. Thanks for doing an excellent job, Clive. Gordon Stove will assume many of the duties of Honorary Secretary for MinSouth. Other Councillors will be providing assistance.

# **MEMBERSHIP:**

The Society is an Affiliated Society to the Institute of Materials, Minerals and Mining (IoM3). Most attendees to the Society events are IoM3 members who have elected to be notified of Society events. In addition, there are a number of affiliate members who have joined MinSouth directly and are not members of IoM3.

### **MEETINGS:**

# **General Meetings:**

The MinSouth AGM was held online on Tuesday 18th October 2022 where Colin Morrish was appointed President.

9 technical meetings were held and 1 social event (quiz). Of the technical meetings, 3 were held on-line only and the rest (6) were hybrid with both physical and on-line attendees. These included joint events held with the British Tunnelling Society (Feb), Women in Mining (May), Young Mining Professionals (April) and the SCMMMS (June), as well as the Young Persons Lecture Competition (March).

Average attendance for the top 8 technical meetings was 65 persons (54 - 2021/22). The growth in total numbers of attendees (including on-line) hides a downward trend in physical numbers. The number of physical attendees was 22 (31 - 2021/22) and on-line attendees 43 (23 - 2021/22). This illustrates the

growing preference for on-line attendance even when a physical meeting was held. This will have consequences for the size and type of venues that we can use for future physical meetings. It is MinSouth's desire to continue holding physical meetings for the foreseeable future.

# **SOCIAL ACTIVITIES:**

# **Mining Quiz:**

A mining themed quiz was again held in December. Council would like to express its thanks to Julian Aldridge for compiling the questions and hosting the competition.

#### **Mining Sundowner:**

Although the Sundowner is not formally a MinSouth event, it has traditionally been supported by MinSouth members. It is on the last Thursday of every month. Thanks are due to the organising committee which includes Michael Forrest representing MinSouth.

### **COMMUNICATIONS:**

#### Web Site:

The web site provides comprehensive information and news on MinSouth activities. The site has now been updated and moved to a new server. The Council expresses its thanks to Mike McLoughlin for his help with the new site.

### **Social Networking:**

The move to the use of online presentations during the year has also resulted in a significant increase in use of social media. During the year there were 2,210 views of recorded presentations compared with 2,580 the year before. The MinSouth LinkedIn site has 590 members (567 - 2021/22) and X (Twitter) account with 808 followers (731 - 2021/22). Due to problems with the existing LinkedIn site a new site was created that should be easier to manage and share. Existing members are encouraged to transfer to the new site.

#### **COUNCIL MEETINGS:**

Ten Council Meetings were held during the year. These are held before the General Meeting each month. There was an additional on-line meeting in September 2022.

# **FUNDING:**

The IoM3 sponsored the society a total of £3,636 in 2022/23 (£3,224 - 2021/22). In addition another £1,951 was received from IoM3 at the very end of the year which relates to the 2023/24 period.

#### **SCHOOLS PROGRAMME:**

MinSouth continued its educational support through the year. Specifically, this involved maintaining contact with the Earth Science Teachers Association, (ESTA) and including information and teaching materials for both teachers and students on the MinSouth website.

### **STUDENT PROGRAMME:**

### **Sponsorship and Support:**

MinSouth is continuing to sponsor university students. The total support given to Students over the past 13 years now totals £32,000, with 28 students having received grants. This year MinSouth sponsored Adelaide Swaneopoel (CSM) with a £1,000 award, and Isaac Young (CSM) and Pia Airisniemi (CSM) with £500 each to assist through their undergraduate studies. In addition, prizes totaling £400 were awarded at the Young Persons' Lecture Competition.

#### **Student Sections:**

MinSouth continues to support Student Sections at several universities including the Camborne School of Mines and the Royal School of Mines. We continue to reach out to other institutions running appropriate courses with the aim of encouraging further student participation in our activities.

#### **CHARITABLE DONATIONS:**

A donation was made during the year to Camborne School of Mines Mining Games for £500.

The impact of the COVID pandemic and subsequent travel disruptions due to train strikes continued to be evident. The grant received from IoM3 for the year was £3,636 (see note above) compared with £3,225 the year before. On the expenditure side, not all meetings could be held physically which kept expenditure down, but this was offset by increasing venue costs and minimum charges for catering. Application for travel grants was also zero. For the 3<sup>rd</sup> year this allowed for greater sponsorship of undergraduates with 3 students being supported.

Expenditure was £6,753 compared with £8,018 the previous year.

The net result was the Society saw <u>increase</u> of funds for the year of £311. In addition, the next IOM3 grant payment for 2023/24 was received before the year end and so boosted funds a further £1,951.

Cash reserves stand at £27,986 as of 30<sup>th</sup> June 2023.

### **SPECIAL THANKS:**

The President wishes to express his sincere thanks to all Councillors for their support throughout the year, despite often hectic work schedules. Without the willing support of the councillors the post of President would have been a lot harder.

Finally, Council wishes incoming President Mark Burnett every success in his year of office.
